MODULE 2: GENDER EQUALITY & LAW

Speaker: Ms Abha Malhotra

Ms. Abha Malhotra is the Senior Council for Union of India. She covered Module 2 of Gender Equality and Law. She began her discussion by asking, "What is gender?" Male and female are the two genders, but Google says there are 72 types of gender, so I've limited myself to male and female. Then she comes across the word 'Equality.' What exactly is equality? According to the dictionary, it is the absence of arbitrariness, the absence of discrimination, and the abhorrence of willful behavior, so we will be dealing with gender equality and law. MODULE 3: GENDER MAINSTREAMING: INTENTION Vs. ACTION


Speaker: Aastha Narang Date: 19th June 2021

Ms. Aastha Narang is the Founder of TYUF.in and Sr. Associate Centre for Civil Society. She deliberated on the topic of Gender Mainstreaming: Intention Vs. Action in detail and highlighted the meaning, issues, challenges, and solutions thoroughly with regard to the topic for our participants. Her presentation was lively, interactive, and in-depth. The presentation then moved on to trace the global history of the concept and the term of gender mainstreaming. Ms. Aastha highlighted that there are three watershed moments in the history of mainstreaming. Furthermore, five schemes of the Government of India: MGNREGA, PMAY, Samagra Shiksha, Saksham, Anganwadi NRLM and how the onslaught of pandemic affected a large number of women who have been pushed out of the workforce. Lastly, ma'am concluded that quite contrary to the classical solution of reserving women seats in jobs/ making it necessary to hire women, there is a need to make it expensive for employers to discriminate. For this, she says that when there is a greater choice of employers to choose from, then it creates a need for employers to provide the best of perks and avoid all gender discrimination.





Speaker: Dr. Sugandha Ramamorthi

Dr. Sugandha Ramamoorthi is an Associate Professor, Department of Economics, Lady Doak College, Tamil Nadu. She covered the topic of the Gender Gap in STEM comprehensively for the participants. She brought the topic alive with everyday examples and anecdotal experiences for our participants highlighting the leaks in the STEM pipeline, the need to have gender perspectives in STEM, and the ways of closing the gaps in Gender in STEM. Then her presentation brought out the educational scenarios, where the number of women in science and engineering is growing, yet men continue to outnumber women, especially at the upper levels of these professions. She educated us about the term "Spatial Discrimination" and the way it is used in promoting male dominance in the society and workplace and in restricting women from enhancing their knowledge. Finally, the presentation concluded with Dr. Sugandha Ramamoorthy suggesting steps for a way forward to close the gender gap. The most important thing that she highlighted was that the studies suggest women can overcome barriers such as stereotypes and bias by focusing on their individual identity, self-concept, self-efficacy, and a strong sense of community. Self-efficacy refers to a judgment about one's ability to perform to or achieve at a designated level. A high sense of self-efficacy can lead to persistence in STEM majors.

MODULE 5: GENDER INEQUALITY IN POLITICS

Speaker: <u>Dr Anita Tagore</u>

Dr. Anita Tagore is an Associate Professor at, Department of Political Science, Kalindi College, University of Delhi. Her areas of expertise include Human Rights, Gender and Environment, feminist theory and Practice, and Comparative Government and Politics. Ma'am specializes in political science and has a work experience of 2 decades. Prof. Tagore has pursued her law degree from the Faculty of Law, DU. She has been a part of many administrative committees. Ma'am also has her work published in National and International Journals. Prof. Tagore has also been a columnist for many newspapers in recent times. The module's objective was to gauge gender representation in democratic politics and gender-egalitarian societies. She broke down the topic into four parts and explained how pervasive gender inequality subsists in the Indian political system. Lastly, the session ended with a Question and Answer session which was answered Dr. Anita Tagore.

Dr. Anupreet Kaur Mavi is an Assistant Professor in University Institute of Applied Management Sciences, Punjab University, Chandigarh. Ma'am has completed her MBA in human resources and Ph.D. in Economics. Dr. Mavi has teaching experience of over two decades. Ma'am has guided a lot of MPhil students who have worked on diverse areas such as Women's role in Punjab Agriculture, Poverty amongst small and marginal farmers, etc., and currently two of the Ph.D. Students are enrolled under her guidance. Ma'am has also authored a book titled "Educated Unemployed: Problem, Policy, Measures to Generate Employment" The main thrust of the lecture was the unpaid work and nurturing activities performed by the females in the society. Dr. Mavi then introduced Green Economy and Purple Economy to the participants. Dr. Mavi concluded her lecture by saying that women may not be able to exercise choice over well-defined preferences because of the circumstances under which they live (their social position), and their socialization as self-effacing nurturing beings rather than ego-centered agents.



Speaker: Dr. Parmod Kumar

Prof (Dr.) Parmod Kumar Mehra, MA, PGDT, PGDDE, M.Phil., Ph.D. in English is a Professor of English in the School of Humanities, Indira Gandhi National Open University, New Delhi. He centrifuged six books centering on Literature, criticism, and translation. He has undertaken serious research work on Gender studies from an interdisciplinary and Transdisciplinary perspective. The main thrust of his lecture revolves around the role played by the media, gender studies, and globalization of the 21st century - a challenge and reward in the modern days. Sir lastly discussed the way to change the mindset of society by addressing several ways like the gender gap pay, improving work-life balance, promoting gender mainstreaming, and focusing on skills required in the workplace with recommendations by Bathla Sonia 1998, women, democracy and the media, New Delhi, Sage and Norris P(ed) 1997 women, media and politics, New York, Oxford University Press.

MODULE 8: Gender Intersection: Caste, Class and Gender Violence in India

Speaker: <u>Dr. Parmod Kumar</u> Date: 08th July 2021

The speaker for this module was Prof. (Dr.) Parmod Kumar Mehra, Professor of English in the School of Humanities, Indira Gandhi National Open University, Delhi. . He has written six books centering on Literature, Criticism, and Translation. He has undertaken serious research work on Gender studies from an Inter and Transdisciplinary perspective. He spoke on the topic- "Gender Representation in Media and Gender Intersection: Caste, Class and Gender Violence in India". He discussed the intersection of gender and marginality which has led to the increasing cases of violence against Dalit women. While exploring the problem he also tried to find a solution to the problem. Lastly, he emphasized on remedies such as a mass campaign program should be initiated which will spread knowledge about the rights and freedom of Dalit women, limited prohibition on alcoholic drinks is required as it (alcoholism) acts as a catalyst in increasing violence, increase the literacy level among the Dalit women (though the scheme of free education is there there is much need to encourage literacy among the Tribal women.) Witness protection must be on the highest agenda as in many cases the Dalit witnesses are murdered. A lot of coordination is required between the NGOs and the government authorities and there must be better coordination among the law enforcing agencies.



MODULE 9: WOMEN GENDER AND FEMINIST STRUGGLE IN INDIA

Speaker: Shruti Vip Date: 09th July 2021

Dr. Shruti Vip is an Assistant Professor of History in the PGDAV College at the University of Delhi. She spoke on the topic, "Women, Gender and Feminist Struggle in India" She explained the term "feminism" as a social movement aimed at elimination of racial inequality and promotion of the rights of women. Dr. Shruti traced intersectionality in pages of history like Colonial, Post-colonial and intersectional struggles for rights and also mentioned about Radical Feminists; Postmodern Feminist, Critical Feminist. She talked about the medieval, colonial, and post-colonial set up in India. The session concluded that Gender inequality is an important aspect that deserves special attention. Women and girls represent half the population and our society has not been fair to this half. Their socio-economic status is improving, but gaps persist ."Gender Inclusive Development" should be our main aim for the overall development of our country. In India, despite several years of planned development, equal participation between men and women in economic and political activities has not been achieved. Economic development is not enough to shrink all gender disparities-corrective policies and robust implementation strategies that focus on persisting gender gaps are essential. The struggle against violence and women trafficking, the fight for equality at work, and against sexual harassment has got a long way to go.



MODULE 10: GENDER JUSTICE: FEMINIST JURISPRUDENCE

Prof. Vageshwari Deswal is in the Faculty of Law, University of Delhi, New Delhi. She took the session on Gender Justice: Feminist Perspective. In the session, she talked about what Feminist Legal Theory is, how it affects us, and the changes it has brought about in our lives and law. In her presentation, she covered the topics like Acid attacks, Assault or use of criminal force on a woman with intent to disrobe, Voyeurism, Stalking, and many of such topics related to female jurisprudence. The session ended with numerous questions from the participants which were answered by the eminent speaker.




MODULE 11: GENDER JUSTICE AT HOME AND WORKPLACE


Speaker: Prof.(Dr) Manjula Batra Date:16th July 2021

Dr. Batra serves as the Chairperson of the Ordinance Committee of Jamia Millia Islamia. Dr. Manjula talked about what patriarchy is and further went on to discuss topics like Gender Injustice at Home(Domestic Violence and protection against Domestic Violence) and Workplaces. In the end, Prof Batra rightly said that both males and females are interdependent on each other. There is a need to make changes in the policies and the environment of the public as well as the private sector. The policies should be women-friendly. There should be policies that cater to women's issues; children's issues; maternity benefit issues; only then can we say that Gender Justice has been done at home and the workplace.

MODULE 13: Gender and LGBTQ Rights

Speaker: Ms.Sowmya Gupta Date: 24th July 2021

Ms. Sowmya Gupta is a Hijra Trans Activist and Deputy Programme Manager, The Humsafar Trust, New Delhi. Ms. Sowmya Gupta is an activist working with the transgender community for the last two decades. Currently, she is working with The Humsafar Trust. Ms. Sowmya works with key stakeholders: government/ non-government bodies, UN agencies in India, including LGBTQ community sub-groups, to provide inputs on developing progressive and inclusive LGBTO Policies in the country with her efficient advocacy and networking skills. The basic aim of the module was to understand the relationship between gender and LGBTQ Rights. Gender roles, as previously noted, continue to be a huge roadblock in providing the LGBTQ community with everything they deserve. The goal of the module was to gauge the relationship between gender and LQBTQ rights. She enlightened us with concepts of Cisgender, Transgender, Sexuality, Sexual Orientation, and Sexual Behaviour. She concluded this very informative lecture by adding that the term sexual orientation is now included as a ground for discrimination under Article 15(1). The most interesting aspect of this lecture was Ms. Sowmya's side-by-side clarification of the participants' doubts. There was no uncertainty in anyone's mind, and all went with a clear and optimistic mindset.



MODULE 14: GENDER AND HEALTH

Speaker: <u>Dr. Anu Mehra</u> Date: 29th July 2021

Dr. Anu Mehra is an Associate Professor in Law Centre-1, Faculty of Law, the University of Delhi who discussed the topic Gender and Health. The main thrust of the module was the information symposiums, to between gender and health. Dr. Anu Mehra talked about gender inequality faced by women and said that Gender inequality and discrimination faced by women and girls puts their health and well-being at risk. She then discussed mental health and sexual health and major legal cases related to them. While concluding the module, Dr. Mehra said that It may be time to frame gender mainstreaming explicitly as an issue of equity, rights, and justice: health as a basic human right, and gender equality as a basic consideration in health The focus should shift from 'integration' of gender issues into existing agendas, to reframing the agenda in a way that promotes gender and social equity in health.
